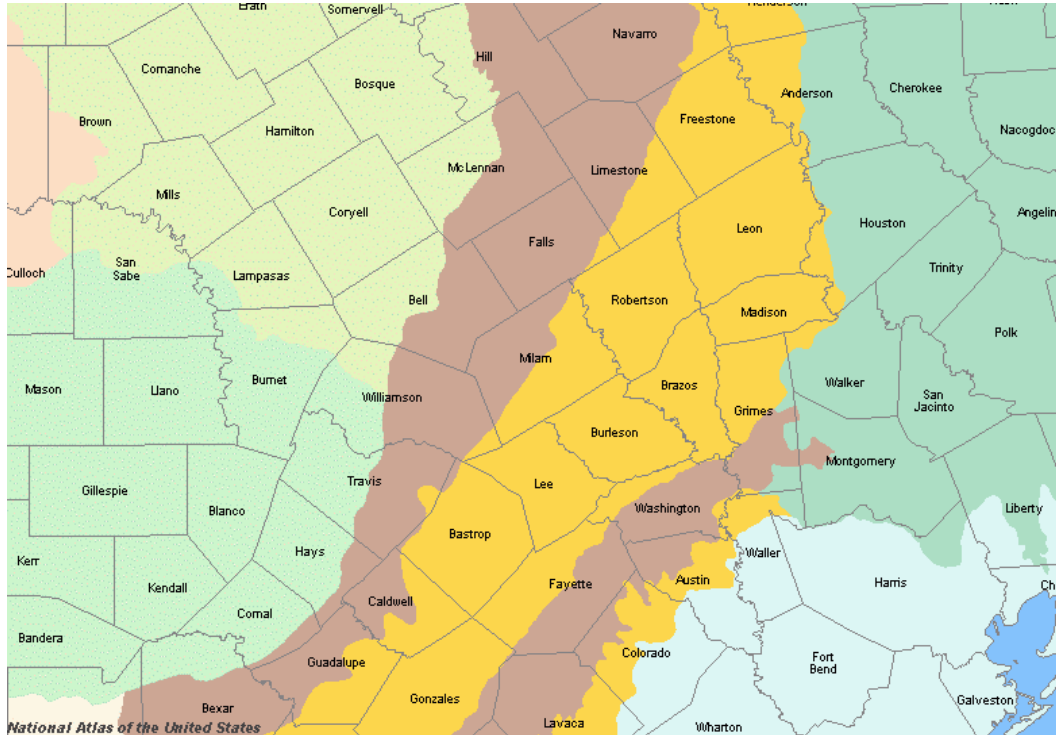


Fall 2022: Central Oaks & Prairies of Texas

This report is from 1 August to 30 November 2022. It includes sightings from the following counties: Austin, Bastrop, Bell, Brazos, Burleson, Falls, Fayette, Freestone, Grimes, Lee, Leon, Limestone, McLennan, Madison, Milam, Navarro, Robertson, Travis, Waller, Washington, and Williamson.



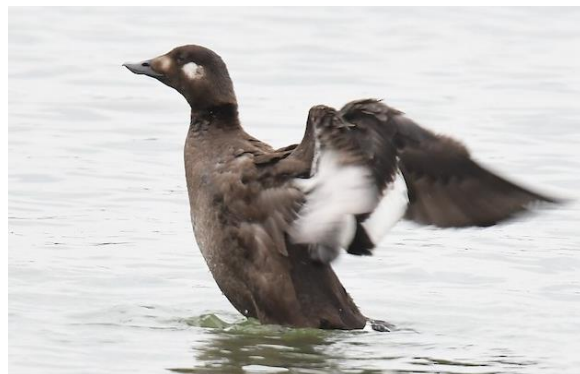
MOST UNUSUAL SIGHTINGS:

Black-bellied Whistling-Duck – New county-high counts for Black-bellied Whistling-Duck were 107 at Centerville Road, Austin Co 24 Sep (Erik Wolf) and 300 at Round Rock, Williamson Co 10 Nov 2022 (Simon Walker).

Redhead – A record-high total for Brazos Co was 700 Redheads counted as groups of 50 that all eventually joined into a single massive raft at Lake Bryan 5 Nov (Keith Andringa, Rhett Raibley).

White-winged Scoter – A White-winged Scoter created lots of local attention at Walter E. Long Lake in Travis Co 22 Nov—7 Jan (Erik Sauder, ph. Joseph Mitchell, ph. Davy Tolman, m.ob.) and generated 177 eBird reports. Less well known was one photographed at Lake Fayette 26 Nov (ph. Kenneth Bader), a first record for Fayette Co.

Red-breasted Merganser – A count of eight Red-breasted Mergansers was a new high for October in the central Oaks and Prairies; these were at Lake Bryan, Brazos Co 17-24 Oct (Bill Eisele) where a few remained until 14 Nov.

Chuck-will's-widow – Difficult to interpret, an experienced wildlife biologist familiar with the call of a Chuck-will's-widow heard one calling 28 Nov (Dianne Robinson) at a residence near Fenway Park in Riviera Springs, western Williamson Co. This is unusual both because of the very late date and because it was calling, which they only do during the breeding season but may reinitiate before migration.

Blue-throated Mountain-gem – A first for Travis Co, a male Blue-throated Mountain-gem was photographed at a hummingbird feeder at Brittlyns Court 28 Oct (ph. Andy & Ellen Filtress, ph. Jane Tillman).

Calliope Hummingbird – A Calliope Hummingbird at Repka Road was a first record for Waller Co 30 Oct—8 Nov (Fred Collins). Single Calliope Hummingbirds were reported at Milton Reimers Ranch Park, Travis Co 19 Aug (Jeffrey Jackson), at Austin in Williamson Co 3 Sep (Steven McDonald), at a residence near Wild Basin Preserve in Travis Co 28 Oct (Michael Curran). The first two were new locations while the Wild Basin site was visited multiple times in the past two winters.

Allen's Hummingbird – A first documented record for McLennan Co, a green-backed hummingbird photographed 27 Aug 2022 (ph. Alisha Flanary) at Riesel City Park was attributed to Allen's Hummingbird because it lacked a notch on R2.

Broad-tailed Hummingbird – Broad-tailed Hummingbirds made a good showing with four locations in the Hill Country of Travis Co and Williamson Co (where they are occasional), including an unusual two at Rob Roy, Travis Co 11-12 Nov (Michael Curran), plus five singles at prairie counties (where it is rare), including southern Austin, Travis Co 7 Oct—28 Nov (Carl Becker), central Austin 14 Nov (Chris Gunter), Kurten in Brazos Co 23 Oct (Shirley Wilkerson), west of Bastrop in Bastrop Co 22-30 Nov (Adeline Fox), and Repka Road in northern Waller Co 11 Sep (Fred Collins).

Virginia Rail – A second record of Virginia Rail for Milam Co was at Davilla 10 Nov (Sean Mecredy).

Common Gallinule – The Common Gallinule first found at Cedar Park Regional Medical Center in Williamson Co 16 Apr was still present 7 Nov (Kenneth Williams) and then seen again the next month. There are less than a dozen records for the county. A new high count of 33 gallinules for Grimes Co was reached 28 Aug (Bruce Neville) on the settling ponds at the former TMPA coal mining area.

Limpkin – A Limpkin at Wood Lake 1-27 Aug (ph. Chris Butler) was the first record for Brazos Co. One to two were found at Sulphur Springs Road 14 Aug—17 Nov (ph. Brandon Woo). A first for Madison Co was 18-20 Aug (ph. Greg Page) at Lake Madison Park. One was again found at Richland Creek WMA in Freestone and Navarro Cos 6 Aug (ph. Martin Reid, Sheridan Coffey). Another was at Barton Creek Wilderness Park in Travis Co 25 Aug (ph. Caleb Helsel).

Whooping Crane – A plethora of rare migrant Whooping Cranes were reported in their passage through the central Oaks and Prairies, including a large flock at Lake Waco's Reynolds Creek Park 13-14 Nov (Randolph King). First seen the evening of the 13th, many observers arrived at the area throughout the next day, watching the feeding flock, and arriving at multiple estimates of 26-41 cranes which included 8 juveniles. The count surpasses the previous high count of 22 for the Oaks and Prairies region. Single Whooping Cranes were reported at West Fort Hood, Bell Co Nov (Matthew Christiansen, Kianna Burtle), along Westinghouse Road in Georgetown, Williamson Co 18 Nov (Sebastian Casarez), and at Granger Lake, Williamson Co 20 Nov (Martin Byhower).

Piping Plover – A first record for Lee Co, a Piping Plover was photographed at Lake Somerville's Nails Creek Unit 2 Aug (ph. Greg Page). A few days later Washington Co also got its first record at Lake Somerville's Overlook Park 7 Aug (Darrell Vollert). Another was at Lake Bryan in Brazos Co 7-8 Aug (John Hale, m.ob.) and one was at Hornsby Bend 16-18 Aug (Jack Lehman).

Marbled Godwit – A very rare migrant in the Central Brazos Valley, a Marbled Godwit was at Lake Somerville, viewed from the Lee Co side 1-6 Aug (Bernd Gravenstein, ph. Greg Page, Byron Stone) and from the Washington Co side 28 Aug (Darrell Vollert). Another was found at Trading House Creek Reservoir, McLennan Co 10 Sep (Randolph King).

Ruddy Turnstone – Rare inland, Ruddy Turnstones turned up at Lake Somerville on the Washington Co side 4 Aug (Keith Andringa) and on the Burleson Co side 3 Sep (Eric Cameron), as well as Lake Travis at Bob Wentz Windy Point Park, Travis Co 26 Aug (Vincent O'Brien, C. V. Sylvan).

Stilt Sandpiper – A new high count for McLennan Co was 63-120 Stilt Sandpipers at Lake Waco's Flat Rock Access 31 Aug—14 Sep (ph. Randolph King).

Sanderling – A first record for Lee Co, a Sanderling was photographed at Lake Somerville Nails Creek Unit 2 Aug (ph. Greg Page).

Baird's Sandpiper -- A rather late migrant Baird's Sandpiper lingered at Sims Lane in Brazos Co 6 Nov (Brandon Woo).

Buff-breasted Sandpiper – Conservative estimates of 800 Buff-breasted Sandpipers on 30 Aug (Brady Schwab) and 450 on 31 Aug (Keith Andringa, Rhett Raibley) at Sims Lane, Brazos Co are near record highs for the central Oaks and Prairies region.

Pectoral Sandpiper – Pectoral Sandpipers were found in large numbers of 110-550 (avg 280) at Sims Lane, Brazos Co 24 Aug—1 Sep (m.ob.). One tarried very late 20-25 Nov (Troy Hibbitts, Marla Hibbitts).



Sabine's Gull – A second record for Brazos Co, an adult Sabine's Gull was at Lake Bryan 24 Aug (ph. Bill Eisele, ph. Brent Cox).

California Gull – A California Gull, one of about a dozen records for Travis Co, was viewed from Bob Wentz Windy Point Park on Lake Travis 22 Nov (ph.† Vincent O'Brien).

Lesser Black-backed Gull – An adult Lesser Black-backed Gull was photographed at Granger Lake dam 30 Sep 2022 (ph. Timothy Fennell, ph. Kelly Holligan) and was the earliest fall sighting among the two dozen gulls known historically for the central Oaks and Prairies region.

Gull-billed Tern – Very rare inland, a Gull-billed Tern remained 11-17 Aug 2022 (Tom Shaughnessy) at a lake behind the Windale Historical Complex in Round Top, a first record for Fayette Co.

Forster's Tern – Unusually large flocks of Forster's Terns early in migration were on the Washington Co side of Lake Somerville when 109 were counted 28 Aug and 150 were estimated 25 Sep (Darrell Vollert).

Black Skimmer – Apparently not storm-related, a juvenile Black Skimmer visited Shipp/Stagner Lake 22-25 Aug (ph. Priest Cantu, ph. Richard Kaskan, Justin Bosler, Ron & Susan Martin). It is the first dated record for Bastrop Co since one marked on a Texas map by Oberholser (1974).

Common Loon – Likely the same Common Loon seen during the summer was reported this fall 11 Sep+ (Suzanne Kho, m.ob.) at Lady Bird Lake, Red Bud Isle, and Lake Travis.



Magnificent Frigatebird – Unrelated to storm weather, a single Magnificent Frigatebird was photographed 20 Nov (ph. Don Brode, George Brode) flying west along River Trail at Hornsby Bend.

Brown Booby – A Brown Booby photographed 17 Aug (ph. Greg Page) flew toward Lake Limestone dam and thus became the first record for Robertson Co and the second for Leon Co. The Brown Booby first reported 17 Mar at Williamson Co continued throughout the seasons to 1 Dec (Timothy Fennell) at Lake Georgetown and reported on eBird nearly 150 times.

Neotropic Cormorant – A record-high fall count of 350 Neotropic Cormorants flew 8:48-9:21 AM 16 Aug (Brandon Woo) northeast over Carlos Lake towards Gibbons Creek Reservoir in five flocks of 50+ birds, about eight flocks of 7-10 birds, various groups of 1-3, plus a few singles. Some were still flying over as the observer left the area. At this time of year cormorants should be in rookeries and feeding young. The flying direction leads to what used be the hot-water pond where partially submerged dead trees provided a rookery in past years before the reservoir was closed to the public. A 35-minute morning count of 170 cormorants was again toward the reservoir 26 Nov (Brandon Woo). By this date, all nesting activity should have ceased and hatch-year birds freely flying. With a 90-minute survey, an even higher count of 580 flew over Carlos Lake in the opposite direction 4:33-6:03 PM 30 Nov (Justin Bosler).

American White Pelican -- A count of 210 American White Pelicans 7 Aug (Randy Pinkston) is high for August in the Oaks and Prairies region; these were at Fort Parker SP, Limestone Co. A portion of 1200 pelicans were photographed on Lake Somerville from Rocky Creek Park, Washington Co 23 Oct (Tom Taroni).

Great Blue Heron – An unusually large number of Great Blue Herons gathered around Shipp/Stagner Lake in Bastrop Co 25 Oct—20 Nov (m.ob.) with a peak count of 65 on 8 Nov (ph. Richard Kaskan).

Reddish Egret – Not long ago, Reddish Egret was a rarity in the central Oaks and Prairies region with about 175 records 1975-2019 in 21 counties. This fall season alone, 92 reports on 69 days included 13 Reddish Egrets at 11 locations in 7 counties 1 Aug—15 Sep. The counties were Bastrop, Brazos, Burleson, Lee, Madison, Washington, and Williamson.

Roseate Spoonbill – A substantial gathering of 60 Roseate Spoonbills was present 21 Sep (David Scott) at Flag Pond, Lee Co.

Bald Eagle -- A pair of Bald Eagles that apparently nested near the Colorado River last winter perched near Shipp/Stagners Lake, Bastrop Co 22 Aug (Priest Cantu). Regular monitoring thereafter revealed three eagles starting 26 Aug (Louise Smyth, Shelia Hargis), eight to nine 26 Oct—20 Nov (Priest Cantu, Louise Smyth, Brooke Smith, Shelia Hargis), ten 6 Nov (Shelia Hargis, Louise Smyth, Bernd Gravenstein), and 14-18 on 8 Jan 2023 (Jason Leifester, Justin Bosler). The latter count included mixed ages and mostly all in view at one time.



Swallow-tailed Kite – A late migrant Swallow-tailed Kite was at Platt Lane, Travis Co 29 Sep 2022 (Eric Feldkamp).

Snail Kite – The Snail Kite first discovered 23 Jul at Lake Somerville SP in Lee Co continued to 3 Aug (Nick Glover).

Swainson's Hawk – In 10 hours at Milton Reimers Ranch Park, a count of 6500 Swainson's Hawks consisted of many kettles throughout the day with each kettle containing 500-1000 hawks 8 Oct (Jeffrey Jackson).

Burrowing Owl – A Burrowing Owl, which is occasionally found in eastern Travis Co, was photographed farther west at St. Edwards University campus 6 Oct (ph. Elijah Wostl).

Belted Kingfisher – On 1 Oct (Claude Morris et al.) a high count of 15 Belted Kingfishers were tallied while 12 kayakers traveled 10 miles along the Colorado River from the Hwy 973 bridge to Little Webberville Park, Bastrop Co.



Red-napped Sapsucker – A Red-napped Sapsucker that frequented a bird feeder last Mar again came to the same yard 16 Oct+ (Mark McConaughy) at Deadoak Lane in northwest Austin, Travis Co.

Crested Caracara – A count of 100+ Crested Caracara consisted of 60 photographed in one tree, 15 on the ground searching for insects, 20 in flight, and other solitary ones, found in the Smithville area of Bastrop Co 21 Sep (Priest Cantu).

Merlin – The third record for Madison Co, a Merlin was photo-documented 23 Sep (ph. Greg Page) at Lake Madison Park and the fourth record was seen at Virginia Lane Lake 27 Sep (Bruce Neville).

Prairie Falcon – An unseasonal Prairie Falcon first reported 16 Jul was last seen at Willis Creek WA, Williamson Co 9 Aug (Bryan Cotter).

Black-capped Vireo – Unusually late for Black-capped Vireos to be singing on territory, two banded males counter-sang with a third newly arrived male at Nameless Road 25 Aug (Paul Fushille) and four singing males were at a breeding colony at Balcones Canyonlands Preserve 1 Sep (Bill Reiner Jr.), both records in Travis Co.

Red-eyed Vireo – An exceptionally late Red-eyed Vireo was described 8 Nov (Kenneth Bader) at Devine Lake Park, Travis Co.

American Crow -- Although Lake Bryan, Brazos Co has supported fall roosts of migrant American Crows in recent years, this year a record 280-300 were counted leaving the roost 8-10 Oct (Brady Schwab); outside of Oct-Nov the normal population at this site is low to mid double digits.

Ruby-crowned Kinglet – Setting a record high count for Ruby-crowned Kinglets in the central Oaks and Prairies region, 92 were counted from multiple large flocks throughout Berry Springs Park in Travis Co 6 Nov (Chris Quezada).



Sage Thrasher – A first county record for Austin Co, a Sage Thrasher was resting on a fence post in a cow pasture near Kenney 20 Oct 2022 (Darrell Vollert). Another Sage Thrasher was photographed at Bastrop SP 27 Nov (ph. Jason Leifester) and apparently had been first reported 22 Nov (Katherine & John Nelson). One was also photographed at Milton Reimer Ranch Park 28 Nov (ph. Maggie Carpenter, Eric Carpenter).

Townsend's Solitaire – A long-staying Townsend's Solitaire 15 Nov—21 Dec (ph. Amy Roush, Roush, m.ob.) was at Hamilton Pool, Travis Co. Three others were at West Fort Hood, Bell Co 16-17 Nov (Daniel Knoc, Kianna Burtle, Matthew Christiansen, ph. Chelsea Plimpton, Charlie Plimpton).

American Pipit -- A calling flock of 21 American Pipits at Union Grove WMA on Stillhouse Hollow Lake, Bell Co 2 Oct 2022 (Matthew Christiansen, Chris Waas) was a high count for so early in migration.

Black-billed Cuckoo – Casual as a fall migrant in the Oaks and Prairies region, a Black-billed Cuckoo was feeding on a caterpillar when it called diagnostically 4 Sep (Callen Inman) at Platt Lane, Travis Co.

Red Crossbill – A very early Red Crossbill visited a bird feeder three days in a row 5-7 Sep (ph. Brian Ellyson) at Bee Cave, Travis Co. Another was a flyover mostly identified by call 16 Nov (Caleb Helsel) at Westlake High School, Travis Co.

Lesser Goldfinch – Milam Co's first Lesser Goldfinch was a singing bird 1 Sep (Sean Mecredy) at Donahoe Creek and CR 402.

American Goldfinch -- An early male American Goldfinch arrived at Elgin, Bastrop Co 20 Aug (Jason Leifester).

Cassin's Sparrow – In Travis Co, Cassin's Sparrow is a scarce resident rarely reported in fall. Thus, a noteworthy report is two adults and one juvenile on territory at Milton Reimers Ranch Park 6 Aug (Jeffrey Jackson) and a single sparrow photographed while foraging at Hornsby Bend 6 Sep (ph. Jeff Osborne, Janet Davis).

Grasshopper Sparrow – A count of 15 Grasshopper Sparrows is unusually high for the fall season, these found 6 Oct (Caleb Helsel) at Barton Creek Wilderness Park.

Dark-eyed Junco – The Oregon form of Dark-eyed Junco is identified on 8% of reports in the central Oaks and Prairies region, making it rare. Thus, it is likely the same family of closely monitored migrant juncos visited a Leon feeder 15 Nov 2021—26 Mar 2022 and returned the following year 6 Nov 2022—11 Jan 2023+ (Greg Page).

Dark-eyed Junco x White-throated Sparrow (hybrid) – A nicely photographed sparrow appears to be a Dark-eyed Junco x White-throated Sparrow (hybrid), clearly exhibiting features of both, at Bauerle Ranch Park in Travis Co 8 Nov (ph. Annelia Williams).

Lincoln's Sparrow – Exceptionally early were single Lincoln's Sparrows at St. Andrew's Episcopal School, Travis Co 6 Sep (Jeff Osborne) and Cedar Park, Williamson Co 7 Sep (Brush Freeman).

Ovenbird – An incredibly early Ovenbird was photographed 15-16 Aug (Debby Jones, ph. Anna Stalcup) on the ground under a feeder at a home northwest of Bastrop, Bastrop Co. Prior to this report, the earliest fall Ovenbird in the central Oaks and Prairies region was 1 Sep.

Blue-winged Warbler – A male Blue-winged Warbler described at Elgin, Bastrop Co 14 Aug (Jason Leifester) is both very rare and early for the Oaks and Prairies region.

Brewster's Warbler – A very rare Brewster's Warbler (Golden-winged x Blue-winged Warbler hybrid) was photographed 13 Sep (ph. Randy James) at Belton, Bell Co.

Black-and-white Warbler – A new high count in the central Oaks and Prairies region for fall migration of Black-and-white Warbler was 12 female-types at the Texas A&M University Research Park, Brazos Co 4 Sep (Meredith Anderson).

Swainson's Warbler – After a half century hiatus in McLennan Co, a migrant Swainson's Warbler was again found 8 Sep (Randolph King) at Reynolds Creek Park on Lake Waco.

Tennessee Warbler – An early and rare fall migrant Tennessee Warbler was studied 19 Aug 2022 (Gus Cothran) at Foxfire subdivision in College Station, Brazos Co.

MacGillivray's Warbler – Very rare in fall migration in the central Texas, a MacGillivray's Warbler was photographed 5 Sep (ph. Martin Byhower, Jan Laughlin, Nancy Henderson, Belinda Avey) at Sun City – Legacy Hills Park, Williamson Co.

Cerulean Warbler – Accidental in fall, a first-year female Cerulean Warbler was photographed 4 Sep (ph. Martin Byhower, Belinda Avey) at Sun City, Williamson Co.

Magnolia Warbler – Exceptionally late was an immature Magnolia Warbler 25 Nov (Bill Reiner Jr.) at McKinney Falls SP, Travis Co.

Bay-breasted Warbler -- Accidental as a fall migrant in the central Oaks and Prairies, a juvenile female Bay-breasted Warbler was described at Granger Lake, Williamson Co 20 Aug (Jeremy Webster) and another was late 19 Nov (Caleb Helsel) at Platt Lane, Travis Co. Before these two, there were only two other fall records in the entire region since 1980.

Blackburnian Warbler – A very rare fall migrant in the Oaks and Prairies region, a Blackburnian Warbler was described 4 Sep (Suzanne Kho) at Nicholas Dawson Park, Travis Co.

Chestnut-sided Warbler – Not only is it rare as a fall migrant but one photographed at Sulphur Springs Road in Brazos Co 19 Aug (ph. Brandy Falise) is also the earliest record for the central Oaks and Prairies region. Another was observed on the Texas A&M University campus 27 Sep (Laura Sare), a date more central to its historical fall migration dates.

Palm Warbler – An early Palm Warbler was photographed 11 Sep 2022 (ph. Michael Meves) at Commons Ford Ranch. Previously, the earliest in the central Oaks and Prairies region was an historical record 14 Sep 1916 in Austin.

Prairie Warbler – As a very rare and erratic visitor to the central Oaks and Prairies region, this season was a bonanza of sightings, starting with one in Round Rock, Williamson Co 16 Aug (Justin Bosler). Other sightings were 17-18 Aug (Timothy Fennell) at Lake Georgetown in Williamson Co, 24 Aug (ph. Randolph King) at Lake Waco in McLennan Co, 25 Aug (Sean Mecredy) near Davilla in Milam Co, 3 Sep (ph. Brandon Woo, ph. Alexander Cox, m.ob.) at David E. Schob Nature Preserve in Brazos, 10-12 Sep (Bill Reiner Jr., ph. Adam McInroy, m.ob.) at Hornsby Bend in Travis, and 15 Sep (ph. Brent Cox) at Brison Park in Brazos.

Canada Warbler – A scarce inland migrant in fall, single Canada Warblers were found at Lake Georgetown in Williamson Co 19 Aug (Martin Byhower) and at southwest Austin in Travis Co 29 Aug (ph. Sheila Anderson).

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
